A Scared Boy and His Dog

From the desk of Roger Pavey, WIRC Executive Director

We all need someone who will take a chance on us. Who took a chance on you? Did a relative, coach, organization, or teacher ever encourage you to succeed while others looked the other way or scoffed?

Western Illinois Regional Council bets on its customers. We are proud to work for people with limited income—good folks who are just like us.

When I was a child, I entered the foster care system in Indiana. My child protective services caseworker went above and beyond her job duties to make sure Spot, a mangy beagle-mix stray, could go with me, a rotten-toothed abused unruly child. She paid the veterinary bill from her own pocket and convinced my foster parents to accept both me and the dog. We were a package deal. For me, the return on my case

worker's investment is exponential. She improved my childhood because she saw me as a person with genuine needs, physical and emotional. She kept a scared boy together with his scared dog and allowed us to keep needing each other. I don't remember her name,

but I will never forget her kindness.

I have had the good fortune of being involved with social services my entire life. My family received food pantry items from Community Action. I graduated from Head Start in 1974. From college scholarships to shelter programs, I received help at every station of life. I've experienced gentle and effective caseworkers and I've been on the receiving end of bureaucratic judgment that devalued me as a human. Those of us who work with others have a choice of how we approach people, and our choices have a lasting impact that we can too often ignore.

I'm excited and grateful to be the Executive Director of Western Illinois Regional Council. WIRC's caring and dedicated staff work with our neighbors and cities to improve lives and communities. I hope to **SCARED BOY** (continued on page 2)

build on WIRC's solid foundation. Our staff is working on ideas that will improve customer services and make us even more responsive. I will be excited to share these changes with you soon. With many social service programs, applicants sacrifice a level of dignity when they ask for help. A dignified, informed, human response by WIRC and its staff can make the process easier.

Our work is personal. People often come to us at a low point in their lives, feeling like society has given up on them. Western Illinois Regional Council sees value, checking judgments and biases, in the realization that we don't know everything someone has endured to get to this point.

I saw my mother beaten. One summer day, I came home to learn we were going camping until further notice—we were homeless. My father went to prison. I dropped out of college for a while because I didn't have enough money to continue. At many points in my life, people asked me, "what's wrong with you?" Fortunately, there were just enough people asking, "What happened to you?" instead. I look forward to working with the community to ask our neighbors what happened, and how we might work together to make it better. ✿

The annual scholarship was created in memory of Nathan Cobb, who tragically passed away in January 2020. WIRC-CAA manages the Cobb Scholarship at the request of Cobb's parents, Janet and Lee Cobb. After careful review by a committee, the Fall 2022 awards were proudly granted to Ashanti Strange and Nicole Kelly.

Ashanti Strange of Bushnell was awarded the traditional student scholarship. Strange is excited to begin her studies at San Diego State University in California. She is planning to major in Biology with a possible minor in Spanish. When asked what career she would like to pursue, she responded that she would like to continue her studies in clinical psychology and ultimately become a psychiatrist. Through her career, Strange wants to help remove the stigma people feel about getting help for their mental health, and wants her patients to know that they are not alone. She knows that she has many years of study ahead of her to realize her dream, but she is excited for the challenge and opportunity.

Nicole Kelly was awarded the non-traditional student scholarship and is a Macomb resident. She is

Kelly has developed an interest in health sciences management and plans to eventually earn a Master's degree in that field.

Strange and Kelly repeatedly expressed their sincere gratitude for receiving the awards to the Cobbs, who were happy to see Nathan's legacy carried on through the students' passion to help others through their careers.

ENERGY ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAM HELPS WITH WINTER HOME HEATING COSTS

As of September 1, 2022, people who need help with paying their energy bills can apply for a social service program through WIRC. The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a federal grant that helps income-eligible homeowners and renters with reconnecting their energy service and/or paying their electric, natural gas or propane bills. WIRC manages the program in Hancock, Henderson, McDonough, and Warren counties in western Illinois.

"Last program season, over 2,000 households in our four-county service area were able to get help with their energy bills," said WIRC Public Relations Manager Jamie Roth. "The amount that each household receives depends on their situation. We hope people will apply early so they have peace of mind this winter."

Households must be at or below 200% of the federal poverty level to receive a benefit from LIHEAP. The 30-day income guidelines for LIHEAP are based on Federal Poverty Guidelines, State Median Income and the number of persons living in the household. The current income guidelines are as follows: \$2,265 for a one-person household; \$3,052 for a two-person household; \$3,838 for a three-person

household; \$4,625 for a four-person household; and \$5,412 for a five-person household. For six-person households or greater, contact WIRC at (309) 837-2997 or visit their website at wirpc.org/liheap/ to view the income limit chart.

Applicants must submit the following documentation to their WIRC case worker: Proof of gross income from all household members for the prior 30-day period beginning with the date of application; Proof of Social Security numbers or Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers for all household members (individuals without those can still apply and WIRC will advise accordingly); Copies of current heat and electric bills issued within the last 30 days; and Copies of rental agreements (if the household is renting) showing utilities are included, the monthly rental amount and landlord contact information. Other documents may be needed based on the household's specific situation.

Individuals who received program assistance in the past are welcome to re-apply.

Propane customers are encouraged to apply when the program opens in September to take greater advantage of lower propane prices, as propane prices

typically increase during the winter months. By applying early, propane customers will see their LIHEAP benefit go further.

Energy assistance applications are taken on a first-come, first-served basis from September 1, 2022 through May 31, 2023. There are no priority groups this program year, meaning any household can apply at any time. All households in need, especially people on fixed-incomes, are encouraged to ask WIRC about the programs and apply.

To apply, call WIRC at (309) 837-2997 starting Wednesday, August 17, 2022 to schedule an in-person or phone appointment. WIRC team members can meet applicants at designated outreach sites in the following communities: Blandinsville; Bowen; Bushnell; Carthage; Colchester; Dallas City; Hamilton; LaHarpe; Macomb; Monmouth; Oquawka; and Stronghurst. People with mobility or transportation issues are encouraged to schedule a phone appointment.
